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

FAREWELL WITHCOTT

Yes, I'm retiring as many of you have heard! It's time to smell the roses! I started my teaching career at Mitchell forty years ago, the year a teaching friend, Anna Hack, opened the preschool of the new Withcott State School under its first and much-loved principal Lance Wilson. My teaching journey has taken me through many schools small and large, remote, city and country. Time in tricky schools in the Northern Territory, seven years as an Education Officer with Qld Museum, flood clean-ups (more than one), several awards for excellence. The last 19 years has been at Withcott State School, where I've endeavoured to create an excellent primary school library, something that was warmly confirmed by the lead reviewer at our last school review. Tom Otto, my first Withcott principal, had a mission for me when I arrived, 'to turn the library into the heart of the school!' I took that to heart and the 60 - 70 who spend playtime here daily, reading, conversing, playing with manipulative toys and computer games, developing manners, social skills, a sense of belonging and friendship prove its value in our young student's eyes. Tens of thousands of students and families have kept me in the game, made it all worthwhile! The aha lightbulb moments for kids, the myriad moments that bring a tear to an eye, the desire as teacher to



touch and better lives, appreciative hugs decades years later from students and parents. Thank you for the value you've placed on the library, for your support with events, for sharing your children, for steps in family journeys. So many brilliant parents, so many fabulous kids. It takes a village to raise a child and education is a partnership between home and school. You are the magic in the mix. My good wishes go with you.

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
3.4 LUNCH RUBBISH WASTE FOOTPRINT DATA

During our Digital and Technologies unit this term we were challenged to decrease our waste footprint in our school community to make our environment cleaner and to learn how to recycle, reduce and reuse our waste.

We didn't think that it would be much of a challenge because as a school we participate in Nude Food Tuesday each week, so **3.4E** collected their lunch rubbish every Thursday, at each break, over a four-week period. Our initial results surprised us and we soon realised that so many of the foods we eat at school are wrapped in so many different types of commercial wrappers. Although many wrappers are light and don't weigh much, we actually had quite a lot!

After we collected our data, we decided that our school community had to work harder at reducing our waste to make a significant impact. 3.4E would like for our school to continue doing Nude Food Tuesday but would like students in all cohorts to participate in reducing their waste footprints and to challenge themselves to reduce their waste over a similar time each term.


In 2025 we hope that most students are able to leave their wrappers at home to make a significant difference in our school and local community.





This term, **3.4M** has been learning about the different types of waste and digital technology we can use to record data. We decided to collect our general waste over 4 days to investigate our weekly waste footprint. We took our popper containers to the blue recycling bins in the eating area and our green waste went into the compost. Our general waste weighed 204g on Monday, 185g on Tuesday, 224g on Wednesday and 45g on Thursday. On Friday we learned how to create a graph of the data using Excel.

We discussed possible reasons for our results. The most rubbish was collected on Wednesday because it is our tuckshop day and many of us had disposable packaging. It showed us that using lunch boxes and containers makes a positive difference. Our graph clearly showed that we produced a lot less waste on Thursday. We hypothesised that the class ate less food that day because the weather was warmer. Some people might have been trying to reduce how much food wrapping they brought to school because our data was at its highest the day before. 3.4M agreed that packing nude food would help reduce the amount of rubbish in our school environment. We could improve our investigation in the



future by collecting rubbish data over a few weeks, from more classes, to see if there are patterns between the days of the week.





3.4A investigated their waste footprint. As a class we collected our landfill rubbish over 4 days. One day 1 we collected 92 grams of waste. We were able to reduce that rubbish over the next 2 days. However on day 4, which was Tuckshop, we noticed it increased to 137 grams!

As a class we would like to reduce the landfill waste in our community and improve the overall impact on the world environment. 3.4A reduced their waste footprint in 4 days. Imagine what we could do as a whole school over a term! What can you do to reduce your waste footprint?
